## Shipton resigns key job – and party whip

SENIOR Tory councillor June Shipton has resigned as education chairman—and has accused some of her Conservative colleagues of being more interested in power than people.

She has also quit the Tory whip and is now an independent Conservative.

Mrs Shipton has also revealed she tried to resign from the Conservative group last December after a clash with the then leader John Wood over the handling of school closures.

But Clir Wood, who was voted out as leader and replaced by Ken Kettle last week, persuaded her to stay on.

Mrs Shipton regrets not sticking by her decision in December.

"I wish I had kept to my stand then," she said.

"I am still a Conservative party member but I will not be following the Conservative group on the council.

"I feel very strongly that some councillors are more interested in power than policies and that's not what I went on the council for.

"My principles are more important than my position. I feel now that I can best serve the community outside the Tory whip.

"I will be voting with the Tory group on most issues if they are brought about in a democratic way.

"But if proposals are not in the interests of the public I will vote independently."

Mrs Shipton's resignation came hours before Cllr Kettle announced he was replacing her as education chairman.

He has given the job to former mayor Anita Fookes.
